Why Take Part?

Participating organisations report a wide range of benefits from taking part in the Festival. Our last large scale survey indicated:

- 79% of Family Learning Festival organisers reached new audiences as a result of their activities.
- 74% of organisers developed new learning opportunities through involvement in the Festival.
- 73% of organisers ran events that were attended by disadvantaged families or families at risk of social exclusion.
- 84% of organisations highlighted further learning opportunities as part of their activities.
- 96% of organisations indicated they would get involved in Family Learning Festival again.

- Opportunities to work with new partners






Your Families




How to choose?

Instead of This

Close-ended, creativity killing crafts, with predictable outcomes



Try This

Open-ended art provocations with unpredictable outcomes




- Teacher cuts all parts of the penguin's body, including shape, feet, eyes, & beaks
- Child has to tediously paste cotton balls within the lines.
- Teacher directs where the eyes and beak should go.
- This experience is close-ended, teacher-driven, & limiting to all domains.

Remember, if you have to do more work than the children, it's not developmentally

- Child is invited to explore the paints in their own way, while having a real-life image of penguins to potentially guide their experience.
- Open-ended art experiences do not have a predictable outcome and meets various learners where they're at.
- For the child who may be struggling a bit with line motor development, they can freely practice mark making, cotor mixing, while freely working with a thin paintbrush for an unlimited amount of time - since there's no concrete end product in mind.
- For the child who may be advanced with their fine motor skills, they may be inclined to challenge themselves and try to replicate the real image of a penguin, or show you


Tiny treasure hunt

You'll need to keep your eyes peeled for this activity. Hunt for really small things you can fit into a matchbox. Collect little leaves, blades of grass, small snail shells, tiny twigs, feathers and pebbles. Turn it into a competition with your family - who can fit the most items inside their box?

You can take a magnifying glass on your scavenger hunt to help children to investigate their finds. Can they see intricate patterns, subtle colour changes and interesting textures?

Plan your book



Now it's your turn to make a miniature book for your toys

What would you like to read to them? A bedtime story? Would it be a pirate adventure, a fairy tale or a soothing lullaby?



Would it be a factual book about other countries and cultures, about the universe, about life at the bottom of the ocean or about a famous period of history such as Ancient Egypt or the Fire of London?



It could be a graphic novel
A recipe book
A sketchbook

How to make your book



Tools & Materials needed to make one miniature book

Light weight paper – 1 sheet of A4 plain or lined paper (this sheet will make two miniature books); Coloured paper, wrapping paper, magazines or newspaper for book covers and spines; Scissors; Small elastic band, string or even a bobby pin to bind your book; Pencil: Glue



Fold your paper

Fold your A4 paper in half, short side to short side — Take your time to try and match the corners and then flatten the paper with your hand.

Now, firmly run your finger down the crease to create a tight fold.

Make sure to do this every time you fold your paper.

Cut or tear the A4 sheet in half, short side to short side. Save one half to make another book later.



Fold the paper in half, short side to short side,

and in half again, short side to short side,

And in half again, short side to short side.

Open the paper up - there will be 8 rectangles.

These rectangles will become the pages of your book.



Cut the paper with scissors, so you have four sets of folded double

Fold the cut sheets in half, short side to short side

Put the folded pieces inside one another.

This folded block will become the pages of your book.


It is called the book block.

Put the book block to one side.

- Word of mouth
- Consider where your audiences goes, can you put posters up their?
- What they read? Are there school or community newsletters you could include your events? A local paper that would run a story on your plans? Event listings for your local area, or mumsnet/mumbler?
- Who do they listen to? Do your local radio stations share events on air?
- Do you work with partners who could share the events with their families?





Promotion tips

- Keep sentences short and organise in brief paragraphs
- Speak directly to your families, use 'you' and 'your',
- Avoid using fancy fonts as they can be difficult to read
- Repeating appropriate words can be helpful, so don't paraphrase too much.
- Use a readability test; search 'SMOG Calculator'


